Severe Rain Causes Flooding in Loogootee & Southwest Indiana

LOOGOOTEE, Ind. — More than 2 inches of rain dumped on southwest central Indiana Wednesday, sparking flooding in several areas, including the town of Loogootee. Meteorologists say the downpour, accompanied by training storms expected to continue into the evening, has raised concerns about ongoing flooding.

Residents are advised to exercise caution and obey road closure signs. Authorities warn against driving through floodwaters, which can be misleading and dangerous.

Residents also captured images of the floods and shared them on social media. Many of the photos showed water standing near local residences, towns, and businesses, as residents are forced to use caution when travelling on the roads tonight.

Mike Holt, a local resident, posted a photo of rising waters near his home, noting that flooding continues to escalate. Officials report that St. Mary's Road near the former St. Mary's Catholic Church has begun to flood, with waters surpassing two feet in some places and spilling over past County Road 150 North.

Emergency services are monitoring the situation and stand ready to respond as needed.

Emergency management agencies have issued alerts, urging residents in flood-prone areas to stay alert and

avoid unnecessary travel until waters recede. Floodwaters are impairing visibility and making travel hazardous.

Authorities are assessing the severity of the flooding, coordinating rescue efforts, and reminding residents to prioritize safety and stay informed through official channels.

This event underscores the importance of preparedness during severe weather. The National Weather Service in Indianapolis has extended the Flash Flood Warning for all of Martin & Daviess Counties until 12:30 a.m. tomorrow morning, Tuesday, August 5. More rain is expected for tomorrow with severe thunderstorms possible then it should be clear until Saturday, August 9.

Residents should keep updated on forecasts and heed warnings issued by local officials.

Beginning on or around Monday, August 11, crews will close U.S. 231 near Loogootee and Crane. This closure will occur between I-69 and U.S. 50.

This road closure will allow for a chip and seal road maintenance project to be completed. Work is anticipated to take a week to complete, depending on the weather.

The official detour for this project is I-69 to U.S. 50. Local traffic will have access during this closure. Local traffic will utilize a flagger.

Loogootee Post Office Reopens: New Package Pickup Procedures

LOOGOOTE, Ind. — The Loogootee Post Office reopened in late June after a period of closure due to a tornado on March 15. Now, the Loogootee United States Postal Service (USPS) has issued a new update regarding package pickup procedures for residents.

The Post Office has announced that the office in Loogootee is now operational, with normal services continuing to resume gradually. However, customers are advised to exercise patience during this transition period as staff work to transfer operations back to the window pick-up area inside the office.

According to the USPS, the mail window at the post office remains closed at this time. Residents can now retrieve all mail and packages

from their PO boxes located at the Loogootee facility. This marks a significant change from previous arrangements, as there is no longer a pickup option at the Washington location.

For residents requiring assistance with certified mail, signature confirmation, or oversized packages, the USPS has set up dedicated hours. The office will be staffed from Monday to Friday, between 9:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m., and on Saturdays from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. Customers needing help are advised to knock on the door during these hours.

USPS officials emphasized that the situation might change day by day, urging residents to stay informed about any updates to the service schedule. Customers are encouraged to plan accordingly and stay in touch with the local office for the latest information.

The reopening of the Loogootee Post Office is a welcome development for residents who rely on the facility for their mailing needs. The USPS has assured the

community that efforts are underway to restore full service as quickly as possible. For more information or assistance, residents can visit the post office directly during staffing hours or check for updates on the USPS website.



He graduated from Bainbridge High School with the class of 1957.


