Discover Loogootee's Historic District on the National Register

The Loogootee Commercial Historic District has earned official recognition by being listed on the National Register of Historic Places, emphasizing its importance within Indiana's cultural and architectural history. Situated along both sides of John F. Kennedy Avenue, the district spans an area between Vincennes and Butcher Streets, as well as Railroad Street. Its boundaries extend northeast and southeast to the intersections of NE and NW 1st Streets, which lie south of Wood Street.

This historic district represents a significant chapter in Indiana's development, reflecting the economic and social growth of Loogootee over the years. The district is characterized by a variety of architectural styles that showcase the evolution of commercial design from different periods. These structures, many of which have been preserved or restored, serve as tangible links to the community's past, illustrating how commerce and industry shaped the town's identity.

The district's listing on the National Register not only recognizes its architectural significance but also underscores its role as a focal point for local heritage. It attracts visitors, historians, and preservationists interested in exploring the historical narrative embedded within these buildings. MID-STATES CORRIDOR: Opposition to Mid-States Corridor: Stop Wasteful Spending and Protect Land Rights

So, Mayor Elkins and the Huntingburg City Council approved the Interlocal Agreement with Jasper to spend over \$300,000 of the tax payers money. What will we get for this \$300,000? Supposedly, we will get an unbiased, factual study regarding the costs to accept INDOT's relinquishment of US 231. Isn't this the data that both the Tier 1 FEIS and the Tier 2 DEIS provided?

What this over-priced study will not give us are any repairs or maintenance to US 231, nor will it provide any new data. It will give the Lochmueller Group, the Mid-States Corridor RDA, King Hank and Gov. Mike another 6 months to try to cram the Corridor down our throats. It will give the aforementioned another 6 months to try and force landowners to sell their land for an unneeded right of way. It will make the threat of eminent domain 6 months closer.

We have to ask ourselves, what is the rush? The Tier 2 FEIS is not yet published and the Lochmueller Group, The Mid-States Corridor RDA, INDOT and the local cabal must be in panic mode. They are trying to give us, we the people, the ol' bum's rush. "Hurry, hurry, hurry, time's a'wastin', we gotta get this done before the local yokels wise up". So typical of this entire opaque project. I say opaque as there is no transparency in any of it.

This lack of transparency started with Hank Menke's I-67 Development Corporation, a private corporation to build an interstate. Really? A private corporation was going to build an interstate? Then the name changed to the Mid-States Corridor, with more secret, private money to build a highway. This was followed by clandestine negotiations by a freshman state representative to change a 2004 state law to allow "bridges and other highway" projects to be built with RDA funds. There was a reason the original law didn't allow these projects,

it's because that's the role of INDOT.

Now, once again, our elected officials look to ways to increase our local taxes to enable them to spend us into bankruptcy; and, tell us it's for our own good. This foolish Interlocal Agreement is just more proof that we must stop the Mid-States Corridor and the sooner the better. If we don't stop it our elected officials will continue to waste our tax dollars and will keep asking us to pony up more in taxes for more self-serving vanity projects.

Every concerned resident of Dubois County needs to attend every city and county council meeting from now on, if for no other reason than to protest loudly about wasteful spending and the Mid-States Corridor. We are on a roll in our opposition to the Corridor; but, we cannot rest. When we take a rest they try to slip onto our property without due notice, they agree to spend our tax money on unneeded "agreements", and they will try and force us to sell our lands. We must not, we cannot ever rest.

We must continue to resist. We must keep shouting "NO!" We must stop the Mid-States Corridor.

LETTER FROM THE EDITOR: Finding Hope and Faith in Troubling Times

Visiting church after the tragic passing of Charlie Kirk on Wednesday, September 10th, was an intensely emotional experience. The weight of grief pressed down on me like a heavy burden, almost overwhelming, yet also a profound reminder of the resilience of faith. Charlie Kirk's death, though a personal loss, felt like a blow to many young people's hearts—those who believed in his messages of faith, conservatism, and free expression. Reflecting on my past, I recall my younger years filled with mistakes—sins, conflicts, rebellious acts—and struggles with mental health that led me to attempt self-harm. These dark moments left me feeling lost, distant from peace, and questioning my faith. But in these times of despair, I find that hope and love serve as guiding lights, illuminating a path through darkness. Charlie Kirk, regardless of political views, stood as a beacon for many young Americans. His messages—focused on faith, conservative values, and open discourse on challenging topics—offered reassurance and a sense of belonging. He championed the importance of every voice and the necessity of honest conversations for a healthy society. His untimely death, a tragic act driven by hatred, shocked us all. Yet, in this tragedy,

I see an opportunity for reflection—a moment to reconnect with faith at church and in prayer. Since his passing, I notice a revival of faith among young Christians nationwide. According to The Hindustan Times, many churches are experiencing a surge in attendance, signaling that hope endures even amid chaos and tragedy. Recently, I observed that my local church, St. Charles Catholic Church in Bloomington, Indiana, was less crowded than usual. However, watching a livestream from St. John's Catholic Church in Loogootee, I was comforted by familiar faces—parishioners I see regularly. Yet, this week in particular, the atmosphere felt different—heavy with collective sorrow. Humanity reminds us that community, faith, and prayer are vital during crises.

Lane closures planned for U.S. 231 in Martin County

MARTIN COUNTY Ind. – The Indiana Department of Transportation announces lanes closure for U.S. 231 in Martin County.

Beginning on or around Monday, September 22, crews will begin lanes closure on U.S. 231 near Haysville. These lane closures will occur near the East Fork White River.

Lane closures will allow for a bridge deck overlay project. Work is expected to last through late November, depending on the weather.

One lane of traffic will remain open during this project. Traffic will be controlled by a temporary traffic signal. INDOT reminds drivers to slow down, use extra caution and avoid distractions when traveling in work zones.

Several attendees had never been to church before, but they sought refuge and community in this sacred space. During the service, we, along with the priest, offered prayers for Kirk, his wife, and daughters. I sensed a collective hope rising amid our grief. In these challenging times, tragedy can inspire renewal. The increased return of young people to churches signifies that hope and faith are alive—they await rediscovery. We must nurture compassion, open-mindedness, and resilience. Every act of faith and love counters the hatred fueling violence.

Charlie Kirk’s legacy—his messages of faith and free expression—has sparked a broader dialogue about community and hope. As we face an uncertain future, let’s choose faith over fear, love over hatred, and unity over division. Our strength lies in resilience. Grief, tragedy, and pain are parts of life, but so are hope, community, and faith. Holding onto these values, we can build a better, more compassionate world—one prayer, one act of kindness, and one open dialogue at a time.

In the face of tragedy, our true strength shines through when we come together to support one another. I am proud of the spirit of compassion and resilience that defines Loogootee, Indiana. While challenges exist around the world, it only takes one brave individual to make a lasting difference. Let us honor the memories of Charlie Kirk, the victims at Evergreen High School, and all those who suffer globally by fostering kindness, unity, and hope. Together, we can build a brighter future.

2025 Public Meeting on Mid-States Corridor Alternatives in Jasper

JASPER, Ind. (Dubois County Free Press)- The Indiana Department of Transportation will host a public meeting at 5:30 p.m. on October 22, 2025, at Jasper Middle School, located at 3600 N. Portersville Road, Jasper, to present the Screening of the Alternatives Report for the Dubois County section of the Mid-States Corridor. A Screening of Alternatives Report is being finalized for release and will be the topic of the project’s next public information meeting. The meeting will present the latest alternatives being considered and provide members of the public with an opportunity to learn more, discuss access options with the project team, and offer feedback on proposed corridor alternatives. INDOT also announced it had released a request for information (RFI) to the construction industry last week. The RFI seeks

input on contract size, types, and other construction schedule considerations. This engagement will help INDOT develop procurement strategies and support the efficient delivery of the project, as advanced by the Federal Highway Administration’s Tier 1 National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) decision to build the highway in 2023. The RFI is only for the 24 miles of the proposed highway that is in Dubois County. This section was identified as the first Section of Independent Utility to be studied of the five sections. Those sections include U.S. 231 through Spencer County to the Ohio River; a section near U.S. 231 north from Haysville to south of Loogootee; the area around Loogootee; and the section north of Loogootee to Interstate 69. According to INDOT, the timeline for the studies of the other sections

Mayor Kathy Thomson said. "We are committed to supporting our veterans and ensuring they receive the best possible care."

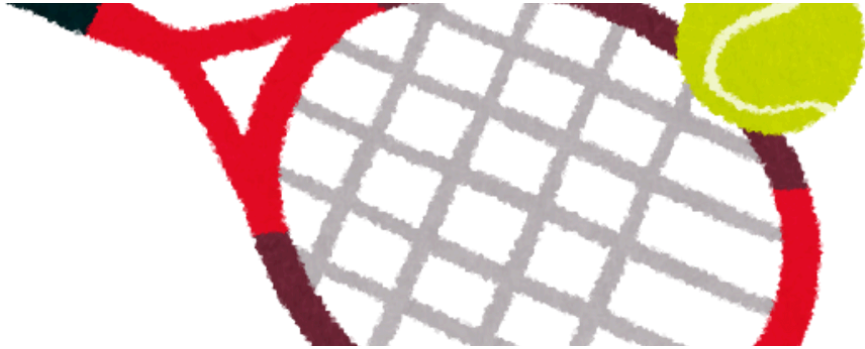
The clinic's opening reflects a broader effort to enhance veteran healthcare access nationwide. Officials hope this facility will serve as a model for similar initiatives in other communities.

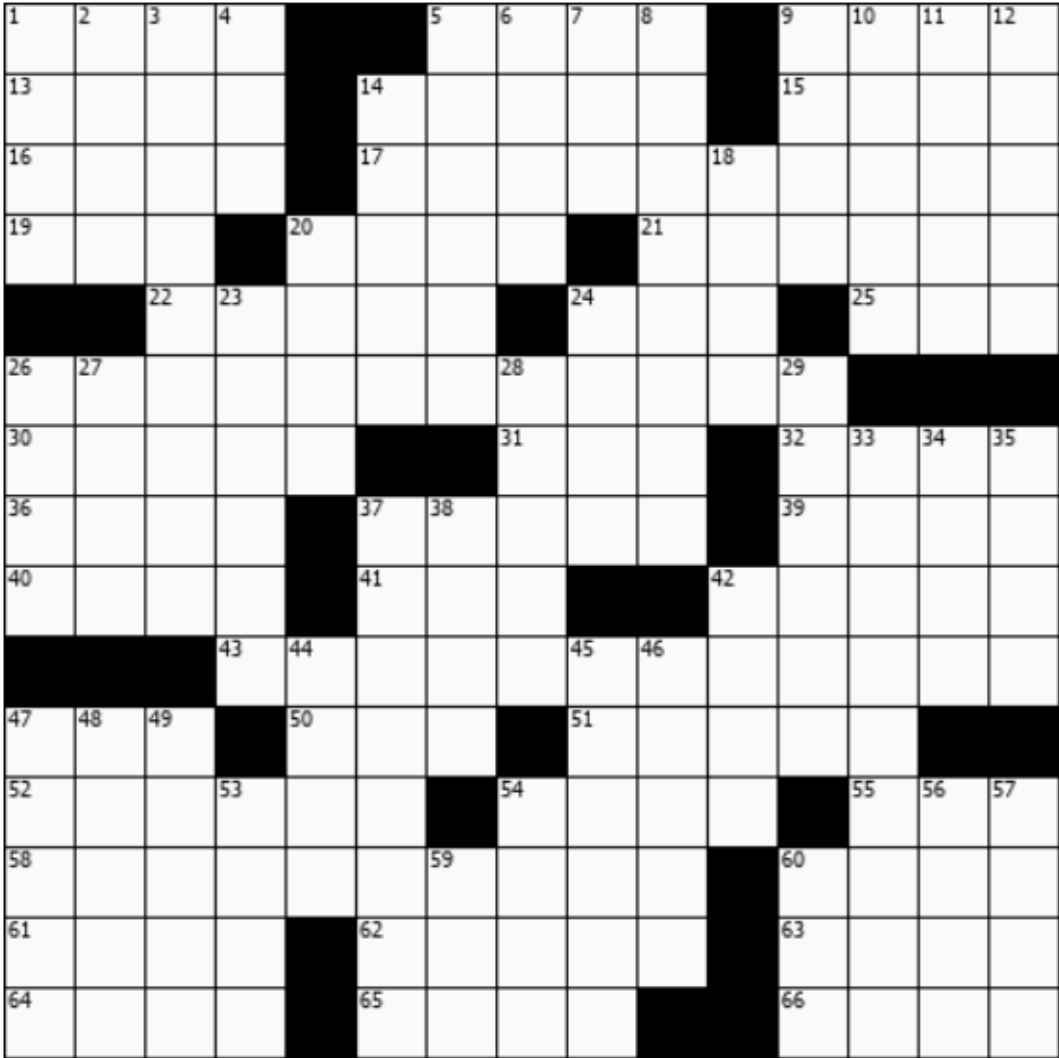
