LETTER TO THE EDITOR: Opposition Grows Against Mid-States Corridor Project

To the Editor,

The bum's rush is on for everyone in Dubois, Martin and Daviess counties; and, it's all about the Mid-States Corridor. Apparently, the people opposed to the projects have gotten under the skin of Gov. Braun, INDOT and all the elected officials in Dubois County and the cities therein.

Look at what's happened in the past 2 weeks. Huntingburg has decided to join Jasper in the Interlocal Agreement to study the INDOT relinquishment of US 231. The cost? In excess of \$500,000. That's a lot of road repairs or other needed services that won't be done. Why the study? To find out what we already know, that US 231 needs repairs and upgrades and is going to cost we the tax payers more money.

Then just the other day Dubois County and Jasper announced they are updating their comprehensive plans, a long-term strategy that will guide the county's and city's growth, development, and investments over the next 8 to 10 years. They say they are looking for the public's input. Both the Free Press and the Herald have links to the surveys.

The same day these surveys were announced INDOT announced "...the advancement of the Mid-States Corridor project and details for the next public information meeting to share the Screening of Alternatives Report in October. This milestone, alongside a recently released Request for Information (RFI) to the construction industry, marks significant progress toward the project's 2027 construction start timeline." Meaning INDOT and the governor wants the project to proceed at full speed as soon as possible.

Why all this activity all of a sudden? Could it be that those opposed are getting stronger? Just recently the Property Rights Alliance (PRA) turned into INDOT another 1,450 signatures opposed to the Corridor from such events as the Dubois County 4-H Fair, the Martin County 4-H Fair, the Shoals Catfish Festival and the Whitfield Hog Roast. This indicates the opposition is not just a few folks in Dubois

County but is regional. Upcoming events where the PRA will be in attendance and gathering signatures are the Huntingburg Herbstfest and Patoka Lake Clean-Up.

Or, could it be all the Stop-The-Mid-States Corridor sign all along US 231 from Huntingburg to Crane? Or the signs showing where local roads will be dead-ended? Or, was it the signs in Hank Menke's and Gov. Braun's neighborhoods? Even to a casual observer the opposition to the Mid-States Corridor is not confined to a "couple of people" as Mayor Vonderheide has stated in the past. It was apparent to everyone that attended, over 150 people, the recent Special Jasper City Council meeting that the residents of Jasper and Dubois County are overwhelmingly opposed to the Corridor Project. Now, in late September, we the people are getting the bum's rush regarding the Mid-States Corridor. There's a rumor that Gov. Braun is personally contacting the mayors and city and county officials and pressuring them to get the Corridor done. If this is true it might explain all the surveys and INDOT announcements.

Here's what we now must demand. We must demand the results of the surveys to be made public, as soon as they are tabulated. We must demand the Tier 2 FEIS be published before there are any more "public" meetings. We must demand transparency from all our elected officials. We must demand that our state Senators and Representatives hold meetings, or attend the PRA's meetings to public state their positions. We must continue our opposition. We must continue putting up signs. We must continue gathering signatures. We must

demand that our voices be acknowledged. We must demand that when the surveys come in opposed to the Mid-States Corridor that our local and state elected officials do our bidding and cancel the Mid-States Corridor.

We are a government of the people, by the people and for the people. We are not governed by a King or a despot. We are self-governed and we demand to be listened to.



The Hoosiers Brace for Tough Road Test at Iowa

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. Iowa's fans are notorious for making Kinnick one of the toughest places to play, Kinnick Stadium," Cignetti said in his opening remarks. "They sell out almost every Saturday. It's loud. So we're going to have to play well. This will be a challenge, a more difficult challenge than the last one, for sure. And the sooner our guys realize that, the better." The Hoosiers savored their victory for the weekend, but that celebration is over. The road now leads to Iowa City, where Kinnick Stadium has been a graveyard for Indiana hopes. The Hoosiers have dropped four straight there, with their last win in Iowa City coming in 2007. Overall, they're just 1-8 against the Hawkeyes since 2008. To snap that trend, Cignetti knows his team must bring total focus and intensity to practice this week, because Iowa will test them in one of the most hostile environments in college football.



"One thing I'm going to say about Iowa is they've been running basically the same defense for a long time," Cignetti said. "Now, there's tweaks. And they've always played great defense and they've got great special teams. They've always been able to run the ball really well. And this quarterback has been a guy that finds a way to get it done. But the thing about Iowa in general, they will not beat themselves. You will have to beat them. They're not going to beat themselves and they play really well at home." Indiana won't be fooled by Iowa's lack of a ranking—the Hawkeyes remain a dangerous opponent. At the center of their attack is quarterback Mark Gronowski, a transfer from South Dakota State who has already shown his dual-threat ability. Through the air, he's thrown for 492 yards, completing 60.5% of his passes with three touchdowns and just one interception. On the ground, he's added 143 yards and six rushing scores, forcing defenses to respect both phases of his game.

"[He's] a great returner, great returner," Cignetti said. "And they've always done a good job on kickoff return. And he took that first swing against Rutgers, he was about five yards deep and was really untouched. He's an excellent punt returner. He's in the 30s on kickoff return and punt return. Wetjen has been nothing short of electric. He's returned seven punts for 235 yards and a touchdown—highlighted by a 95-yard sprint—and added six kick returns for 213 yards and another score, including a 100-yarder. He's the type of weapon who can flip momentum with one touch, and the Hoosiers know they'll need discipline and focus to contain him.

Iowa presents challenges across the board, but nothing Cignetti and his staff haven't prepared for before. With the spotlight on Kinnick Stadium this Saturday at

3:30 EST, Indiana will look to silence the Hawkeyes, stay unbeaten, and keep their early-season surge rolling.


