Loogootee School Board Approves Actions, Highlights Achievements at April Meeting

The Loogootee Community School Corporation Board of Trustees convened for its regularly scheduled meeting on April 16, 2026, in the LHS Media Center, with Board President TJ McAtee calling the meeting to order at 5:03 p.m. Following the Pledge of Allegiance, board members present included Vice President Nick Toy, Secretary Brent Courter, Dr. Brooke Hawkins, and Chad Wade. Corporation personnel in attendance were Superintendent Dr. Brian Harmon, Assistant Superintendent Dr. Shelley Christmas, Director of Curriculum and Technology and Middle School Principal Dana Campbell, Corporation Treasurers Sandra LaMar and Sara Lengacher, Corporation Secretary and Deputy Treasurer Georgia Templin, and Corporation Computer Technician Pryce Hedrick. Also present was Tim Ringwald. No patrons addressed the board regarding agenda items.

The board moved efficiently through its consent agenda, unanimously approving prior meeting minutes and corporation claims and vouchers, each by a 5-0 vote. Personnel matters were also approved unanimously, including the resignation of TJ McAtee as LHS Varsity Tennis Coach and the resignation of Hannah Allen as a middle/high school social studies teacher, effective at the conclusion of the 2025-26 school year. Under action items, the board considered Student Appeal 2026-001. Vice-President Nick Toy recommended affirming the administration's original decision. A motion to uphold that decision was made by Brent Courter and seconded by Chad Wade. The motion passed 4-0, with President TJ McAtee abstaining from the vote.

Dana Campbell provided a comprehensive set of corporation updates spanning all school levels. At Loogootee Elementary School, students and families recently participated in Read Across America festivities, which included themed dress-up days, book character competitions, and reading team activities. The Books for Bingo event allowed students and parents an opportunity to win a book while having fun playing Bingo, while the kindergarten screening and parent meeting helped prepare incoming families for the transition to school. LES also hosted a STEM Night in collaboration with ROI MoMentum, where students explored hands-on activities and learned about microelectronics. The event was

coordinated by Shannon Wagler. Additionally, elementary students showcased their musical talents through spring performances, including the kindergarten program "Singing into Spring" and the first and second grade production "Music Through Time," under the direction of Kaitlyn Chitwood. At both the elementary and middle school levels, academic teams were recognized for excellence, as the LES and LMS Math Bowl teams each earned second place in their respective divisions. Middle School (LMS) students who met expectations for the "Lion Up!" initiative were rewarded with a celebratory afternoon that included outdoor activities and a visit from the Kona Ice truck. Seventh and eighth grade students who demonstrated improvement on their ILEARN assessments also participated in a reward event that

included the opportunity to engage in a lighthearted water balloon activity with staff. Additionally, LMS student Brooklynn Jones completed the ROI STEM Fellows program, which allowed her to participate in monthly professional development on STEM integration and teaching practices, connect with regional partners through key sector industry tours and career information sessions, and become part of a regional STEM Fellowship network. At the high school level, students recently attended prom, themed "A Night in Paris," which was widely regarded as a successful and memorable event thanks to sponsors and volunteers. Academic achievement was further recognized at the Tri Kappa Academic

Additionally, students participated in the ROI Student-Run Business Conference on April 14, attending other student presentations and presenting their entrepreneurial projects. The corporation's spring musical, "The Addams Family," was also highlighted as a standout performance involving significant collaboration among students, staff, and volunteers. With no further business to address, the board voted to adjourn the meeting at 5:14 p.m. by a 5-0 vote following a motion by Brooke Hawkins and a second by Nick Toy. The next regularly scheduled board meeting will take place on May 14, 2026.

Crane, Indiana City Council Discusses Housing, Utility, and Solar Projects in April Meeting

CRANE, Ind. (AP) — The Crane, Ind., city council tackled a range of issues at its monthly meeting on Monday, April 6. Issues included changes to housing regulations, ongoing utility challenges, and a potential solar energy initiative. The board voted to lower the minimum required size for new homes in town from 750 square feet to 400 square feet, provided structures are on a foundation and not on axles. The move came after residents raised concerns about existing homes that fell under the previous size limit and sought clarification on how the town would address such cases. Existing homes under the new threshold will be allowed, but future dwellings must receive board approval and comply with the updated standards. "Moving forward, we will maintain a 400 square foot minimum," a board member said. "No axles,

and it should be on a foundation of some sort." In other business, the board addressed persistent rumors of municipal fraud, noting that an investigation by the State Board of Accounts found no wrongdoing. The board also discussed the status of the town's fire barn property, confirming that paperwork is underway to resolve a previous ownership transfer error. Board members discussed a proposal to use six to seven acres of town property for solar energy, with research ongoing into feasibility and funding. Officials acknowledged that securing a federal grant could take years but described the project as crucial to the town's long-term viability, given rising electric rates and aging infrastructure.



"It's talent survival, really, in a sense," one board member said. "It'll make or break this town if it doesn't get something." The board also fielded public questions regarding town hall closures, promising to provide advance notice via social media and direct phone lines. Additionally, officials said they would continue to research and update residents on ongoing sewer and water projects. The meeting concluded with a motion to close at 6:27 p.m.

THE SCAN IS IN: NEW QR CODE LAUNCHED FOR DUBOIS COUNTY YARD SALES

A new QR code has been introduced to help shoppers easily find the "Master Map" and current sale listings in Dubois County and surrounding areas. When scanned at a sale, the code directs users to the group's page, allowing them to plan their route and discover neighboring sales.

Experts recommend printing the QR code at least three to four inches wide, using high-contrast black and white to ensure readability in bright conditions. Placement is crucial; it should be positioned at eye level near the main "Yard Sale" sign or displayed in a picture frame on a checkout table.

Supporters say the QR code benefits the community by encouraging longer shopping visits and helping buyers find more sales nearby. To save the image, users can right-click or long-press to download, then incorporate it into flyers or print it separately.

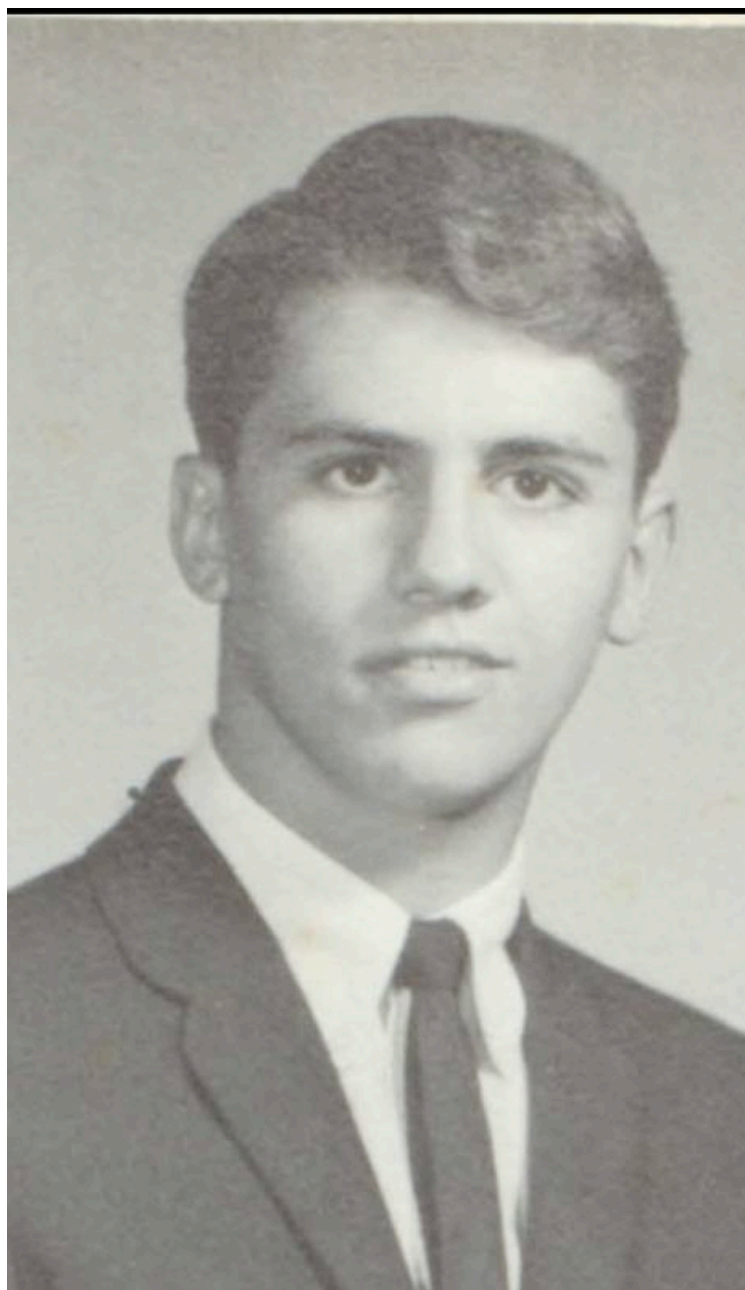

Loogootee Ball Hockey Community Grows with Health and Fun



On a sun-splashed, chilly late Sunday morning in April, the outdoor basketball courts on the campus of Loogootee High School are calm and silent. There was the sound of construction workers rolling dirt around near the Little League baseball field just ahead, but that was about it.

In March and April, especially, the silence usually breaks on this campus with the bounce of a bright orange-and-black ball on a court, as small-town crowds flock from miles around to cheer for the hometown Loogootee Lions basketball team on the hardwood. The air doesn't hear the tune of sticks and pucks; Loogootee usually hears the sounds of sneaker shuffles and the swish, not the collision of hockey pucks and the tap of a hockey net iron post. In a small town where basketball reigns strong, ball hockey is quietly carving out its place, thanks to the passion and determination of two founders who brought hockey to Loogootee—Nathan Chess and Dan Pasowicz.

Growing up in Chicago and Pittsburgh, where hockey is a way of life, Chess, the club founder and avid hockey fan, and Pasowicz, a musician, found themselves far from the ice rinks of their youth. Their love for the game sparked the idea of introducing ball hockey to Loogootee, starting with simple outdoor practices.

Ball hockey is a variation of ice hockey played entirely on foot, using a ball instead of a puck—making the sport accessible to all, regardless of age or experience.

Pasowicz said the Loogootee Ball Hockey Club began as a casual weekend pastime before they decided to organize officially.

"We decided to do this because we wanted to have something to grow," Pasowicz said, "Selfishly, we just started this as a way to get out of the house on the weekends and enjoy some weather. And surprisingly enough, it's gaining a lot of attention. We didn't think it'd be this much, but it's really cool to see, because we love the sport."

The club meets regularly on weekends at Loogootee High School's outdoor basketball court, right by the tennis courts, baseball field, and track. The club usually meets on Saturdays at 4 p.m., weather permitting.

Equipment is minimal: a stick, a ball, and a pair of gloves are all that's required.

The club needs more people to attend their practices. The highest turnout in Loogootee so far was five people. They have practiced against members of other college hockey teams in other towns. The club identified the need for more goalies, especially those in training who have the proper equipment and expertise and who are skilled in goaltending.

Through it all, the club keeps one quality: mind, be relatable to the people they serve in the community who want to try and participate in learning about a new sport in an open, welcoming environment. The club is open to all, welcoming a new spirit that is one of its defining features. "Don't be afraid to ask questions," Pasowicz said. "We're in a very respectable environment out here. We encourage questions. We encourage people to ask things. What we're here to teach too."

Ball hockey's appeal lies in its simplicity and inclusivity. There are no skates, no expensive pads—just sneakers and enthusiasm. The game's rules mirror ice hockey, but its accessibility has contributed to a surge in popularity nationwide.

According to USA Ball Hockey, the sport is expanding rapidly, fueled by its low cost and community focus. Nationally, professional organizations and NHL teams have launched ball hockey programs, including recent efforts by the Seattle team at Title One schools and community centers in Washington, and by the Tampa Bay Lightning, which built 10 outdoor ball hockey rinks in Florida counties for adult and youth play.

Participation rates, especially among youth and girls, are climbing in the United States and in more than 48 countries.



Ball hockey is also great for your overall health. According to reports, ball hockey provides significant health, social, and economic benefits, including a need for high-intensity cardiovascular conditioning. Players often burn 600 to 900 calories per game, improve agility and hand-eye coordination, and have greater accessibility than ice hockey. Cognitively, the sport enhances focus and thinking while strengthening skill sets, such as passing and stickhandling, offering a safe, inclusive, and social environment for players of all ages.

In Loogootee, the club's founders emphasized safety and respect. "People sometimes think hockey is a rough sport," Pasowicz said. "Our sessions are about fun and community. We encourage questions and make sure everyone feels comfortable."

Social media expanded the club's reach. Chess manages the Facebook group, promoting a need for more hockey activity in the area. Pasowicz highlighted how connecting people has strengthened their community.

For Chess and Pasowicz, the hope is to see the club continue to grow. "Perhaps one day we could do pockets of leagues, like, maybe we could go face folks out in Washington, or maybe West Boggs, lake monsters or something, or Loogootee Lions, you know, something you know," Pasowicz said. "Maybe do a weekend tournament, and again, [do it] all for fun."

For now, the courts remain open to everyone—from veterans and newcomers, young and old, those chasing a childhood nostalgia, and those discovering a new passion. As the sun rises over Loogootee, a town known for high school basketball glory, the echoes of ball hockey signal not just a new game in town, but a vibrant, welcoming community in motion.

To the Editor,

The Spencer County Council voted, Monday, April 21, to renew/extend the Mid-States Corridor RDA by a 6 to 1 vote. This was to be expected as Spencer County is already suffering from the effects of the new terrain, 4-lane highway through their homes. The old adage of misery loves company is alive and well in Spencer County. We can hope that on Monday, April 27, the Dubois County Council will do the right thing and withdraw all support from the RDA.

Over the next few days there will be informational Town Hall meetings in Loogootee (April 22), and in Odon (April 28). These Town Halls are open to the public and will give the residents an opportunity to ask questions, see maps of the Corridor's proposed path and have an open discussion about the Mid-States Corridor. Be sure to attend.

Here are some questions to ask at the Town Halls:

- 1) Does the Tier 1 EIS or the Tier 2 DEIS confirm there is a traffic congestion problem in the area?
- 2) Does the Tier 1 EIS or the Tier 2 DEIS confirm the Average Annual Daily Traffic (AADT) is significant enough to warrant a 4-lane highway?
- 3) Does the Tier 1 EIS or the Tier 2 DEIS confirm that new industry/commerce will come to the area, if the Corridor is built?
- 4) Does the Tier 1 EIS or the Tier 2 DEIS confirm by-passes guarantee increased economic development?

One will be surprised by the facts/answers to the above questions.

It's 52 miles from the I-69 on-ramp to the I-64 on-ramp via US 231 through Loogootee, Jasper and Huntingburg. It takes, on average, 1 hour and 10 minutes to drive. The Mid-States Corridor is a 54 mile trip and it will take about 55 minutes for the trip. So, for over \$3 billion we might save 15 minutes on the entire trip. We live in a rural, farming area where the pace of life is, and always has been, slower than metropolitan areas. The important factor is, as we travel less than the entire 54 miles we save less and less time. Thereby making travel time savings a moot point.

It's time our elected officials do the right thing and vote for what the majority of the people want, NO Mid-States Corridor and no RDA. Remember, it's a few who want the Corridor not the majority.

The Mid-States Corridor project is limping but it's not dead, yet. We must end it now and turn our attention to the betterment of our communities. Attend the Town Halls, attend the City and County Council meetings, come to a PRA event. It's time for all of us to oppose the Mid-States Corridor.

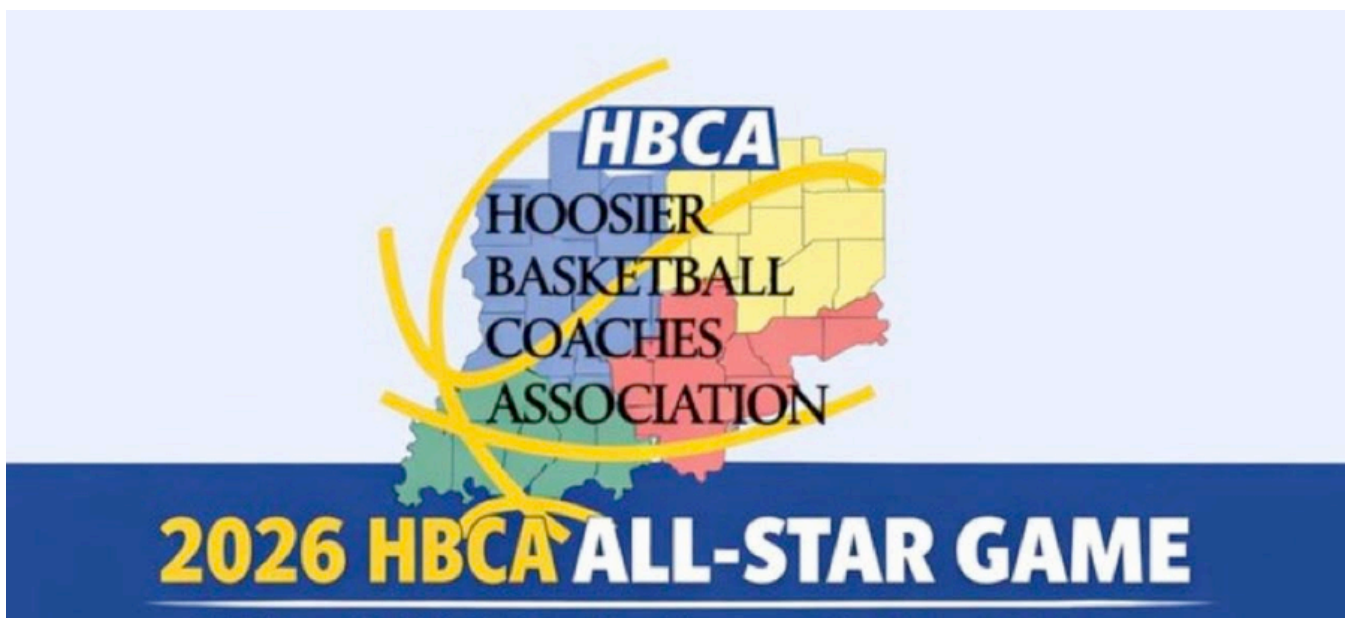

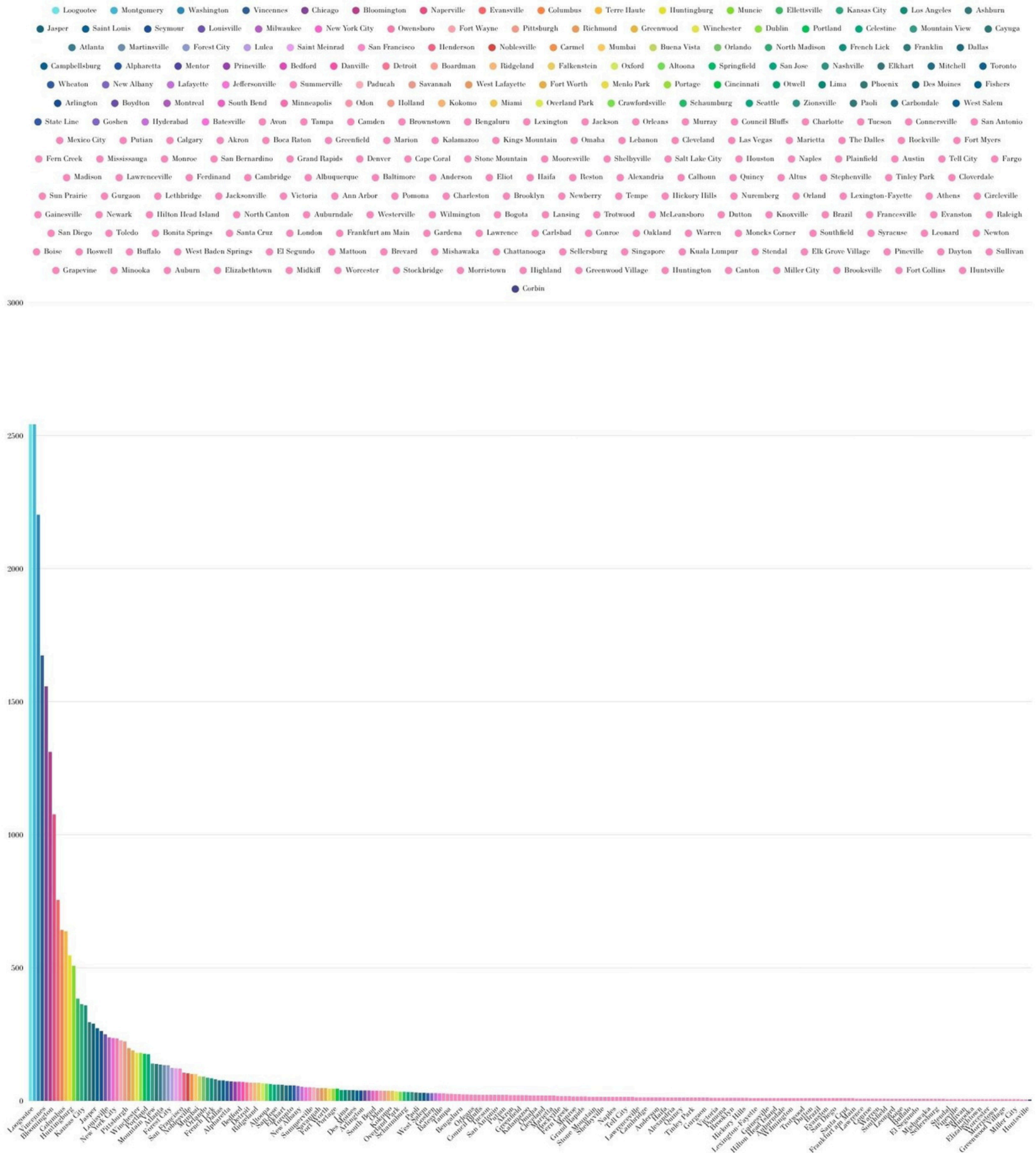

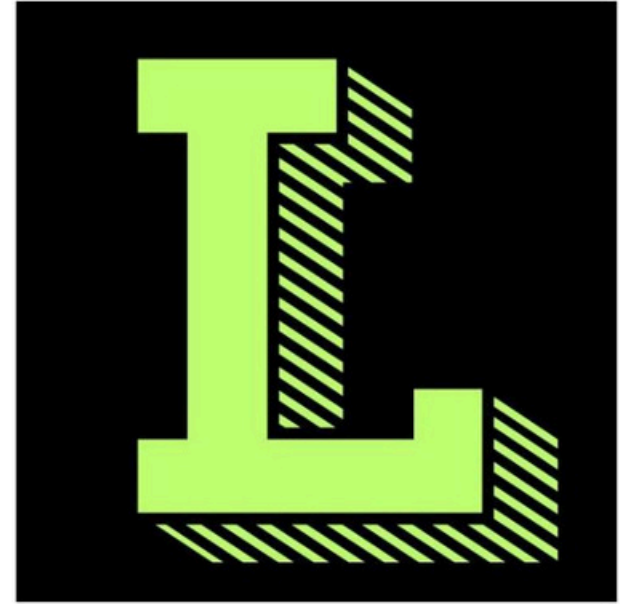
Fonts: All fonts must be embedded in the PDF or converted to outlines/curves to prevent printing errors.
